- cost of living
- employment and training opportunities
- education
- wellbeing





Housing allocation

Work with local communities, parish and district councils to:

- identify real housing need
- build social homes in perpetuity
- give priority to people with a local connection



Social impact

- Brings families, friends and communities back together
- Supports the local economy by providing employment opportunities
- Sustains the local school and/or shop

Case study: Chrishall, Essex





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Cost of living

Design homes and provide services that reduce living costs so families and individuals have more to spend on things that are important to them:

- build homes where there is a real need – helps reduce travel costs and areas where there is no public transport
- reduce heating costs through good design – annual Passivhaus energy bills c.£135pa
- encourage community gardens and food growing
- provide free advice on money matters

The village lost its pub, village school, post office and shop



Case study: Great Ryburgh, Norfolk

2008: Villagers with help from **Norfolk Rural Community Council** and the **Plunkett Foundation** formed a Community Interest Company.

The sale of shares and additional grants from the **Co-operative Fund** and **The Esmée Fairburn Foundation** enabled villagers to buy the Old Granary building, which they fully renovated and equipped.



Case study: Great Ryburgh, Norfolk

Ryburgh Village Shop, opened in March 2009.

It incorporated a Post Office and internet cafe.

Education/Wellbeing

Community Grant: anyone can apply for up to £250 for projects that benefit Hastoe residents and their local communities.

- Especially encourage activities that help young people to learn more about the natural environment, e.g. visits to wildlife sites and farms, building a community garden, digging a pond or installing bird/bat boxes.
